
had no real connection. So our Historical Contributor, Jim Lapp, agreed to take on the case. His findings, with full diligence and his considerable research skills, are on page 13.




HMCS Fraser: "In August of 2010 I became aware of HMCS Fraser finally being scrapped after several failed attempts to get support to preserve her in Nova Scotia. Following the fateful decision to scrap her, it was towed from Halifax through the Great Lakes to a scrap yard on Lake Erie near Port Dover, Ontario. I called the scrap yard after it arrived to ask if I could make a final visit. Upon a reluctant reply, I rode my motorcycle to the yard for this final visit and to take a final picture of this ship just before it disappeared forever.

I served on a sister ship in Halifax in 1969/1970 HMCS Skeena (207) and had several friends that served on the Fraser at the time. We had tied up next to her several times, walked across her brow and sailed together on exercise with her. I was allowed an escorted visit shipside only as she was in the process of being cut up as I took the last picture. Her number 233 boldly showing defiantly on her hull. I believe this was the last picture




taken of her and I can tell you that even though I did not serve on her, I felt like I lost part of my youth as this was the last of the "Cadillac Class" that would be gone forever. I thought I would share this last picture of her as I'm sure it would bring back many fond memories for all those who actually served on her and with her." Sinking of the Valleyfield



Timothy John Wilbert Pollock on July 7, 2006, related to his wife Rita Frances Pollock, nee Robinson, the story of how he on the Giffard and his mates rescued the only survivors of HMCS Valleyfield that had been sunk by a submarine.

Tim's account: "This is my involvement with the Valleyfield although I was never on her. It began April 16, 1944 when I received a posting to the ship. However, when I started my basic training in Vancouver in January - February I was a very immature person so was held back for two months to assist with the training of the next group that came in. I was now entitled to some leave so I went home for a week.

The group from Vancouver went to Victoria. When I came back I went to Victoria and joined the next group that came in. That group had come in from Edmonton so I took my basic training in Naden with them. In it were five school friends who had been together all through public school and high school. I was posted to Halifax with them and then to St. John's, Newfoundland. We did shore duty together and then received our postings. Four of those people were posted to the Valleyfield with me and one was posted to the Giffard. I was approached by the lad who was posted to the Giffard and asked if I would change postings with him so they could be together.

I'd never been to sea before so, to me, one ship was the same as another. I agreed to exchange postings. But before they would allow that they advised me that the Valleyfield was a new ship and had only made one trip. This would be her second run so she was a large clean ship, much larger than the Giffard. The Giffard on the other hand held a crew of about 68 and was a recycled British Navy Corvette, very rough in the water. Well, I really didn't mind which ship I went to. One was the same as the other. So I took the change of posting.

We did our trip to the west approaches off Europe and turned the convoy over. We refueled on the Foyle River; stopped at Londonderry, then back out to join a West moving convoy off the approaches to the West Atlantic. We turned it over to the Triangle Escort Group headed for St. John's, at about 2:30 in the afternoon.

I was going on watch at Midnight so had just got out of my kip at about a quarter to midnight, May 6th. It was ten minutes to midnight when I felt the shock wave of the torpedo hitting. Didn't know what it was about, so got ready and went up on watch. It was later I found out that the Valleyfield had been torpedoed. The bow went down in about one and a half minutes then the stern went down. The ship was gone in nine minutes. " (Continued in the Fall Edition)

Sovereign's Medal for Volunteers:

Announced by His Excellency the Right Honourable David Johnston, Governor General of Canada on July 15, 2015, Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II has approved the creation of the Sovereign's Medal for Volunteers.



Starting in Spring 2016, this new medal program will incorporate and replace the Governor General's Caring Canadian Award (CCA). The medal will carry the same values as the CCA, continuing to recognize volunteers who have made a significant, sustained,

unpaid contribution to their community, in Canada or abroad.

As an official honour created by the Crown, the new medal will be part of the Canadian Honours System. It will elevate the way we recognize volunteers and provide a more comprehensive means of celebrating the full breadth of Canadian achievements through the Honours System.

Until the inaugural presentation ceremony of the Sovereign's Medal for Volunteers is held in 2016, presentations of the CCA will be ongoing. Nominations for this award will continue to be accepted throughout the year by the Chancellery of Honours and reviewed by an advisory committee, which will make recommendations to the governor general. Existing CCA recipients will subsequently receive the medal to complement their award. For more information check the links on page 22.

Naval History

Cornflower: Following the 2015 AGM, Yardarm Editor Pat Cornect asked me to look for an RCN connection to a cornflower. I found there were no Canadian ships named Cornflower. Why Cornflower? At the AGM one of the discussions for fundraising focused on an RCN activity similar to the Royal Canadian Legion Poppy Campaign and Poppy Fund. In 1948 an Act of Parliament granted the Royal Canadian Legion trademark copyright of the Poppy symbol in Canada, around 30 years after the poppy was used as a form of remembrance in many Allied Countries.

Editor Pat reached out to the Yardarm community looking for a cornflower Canadian connection. One response indicated the cornflower was appropriate because RCN veterans experienced a high incidence of ALS, amyotrophic lateral sclerosis, and the blue cornflower is an international symbol for the ALS society. I learned that veterans of all services apparently have a higher incidence of ALS than the general population. In France, the cornflower, or Bleuet de France, is a symbol for veterans, and used for remembrance.



The Ships: HMS Cornflower, a Flower Class Arabis-type sloop/minelayer, was launched exactly 100 years ago in March 1916 at Barclay, Curle & Co, Whiteinch, Glasgow. With a complement of 79, the 260' 1,250-ton ship served as a mine sweeper (fleet sweeping vessel), transporter for personnel and cargo, and as a patrol ship. HMS Cornflower served in the East Indies Station, Mediterranean. Log books may be viewed here: http://www.naval-history.net/OWShips-WW1-18-HMS Cornflower.htm

Patrols over 90+ years ago included ports and areas familiar in recent news: Aden, Akaba, Jidda, Said, Sudan, Suez. 90+ years later and some of the same problems are unresolved. Renamed **Tai Hing**, HMS Cornflower was the HO vessel of the Hong Kong Royal Navy Volunteer Reserve. HMS Cornflower was sunk during a Japanese air raid in December, 1941, a week before Imperial Japanese forces occupied Hong Kong.

Canadian ties to the name Cornflower exist. The third RN ship named HMS Lysander J379 was an Algerine-class minesweeper launched in 1943 as **HMCS Hespeler**. HMCS Hespeler ended service in 1945, and was renamed renamed Chilcotin in mercantile service. Another source states HMCS Hespeler was renamed **Cornflower** in 1956, and broken up in 1957.

Hull M379, in another source, is named as HMS Lysander. This HMS Lysander, according to the source, was renamed Cornflower 1950-1951 and broken up in 1957. Hull M379 was photographed in 1952 in Hong Kong, and identified as HMS Cornflower.

HMS Guildford Castle K378, a Castle Class corvette, according to another source, was transferred to Canada as HMCS Hespeler.

It's confusing. Not all records are digitized. The Admiralty records must have information to answer the questions. Researched and submitted by Jim Lapp.






Items of Interest

First World War Item-WRNS: NEWS TO ME...DID YOU KNOW? In the book "Blue Tapestry" by Vera Laughton Mathews, it is noted no services existed for women in 1914. WRNS, Women's Royal Naval Service, existed 1917-1919. At its peak there were 7000 personnel.

No service existed in between until 1939 when the WRNS unit was revived. However a query from Mr Michael Fish, has located at least 6 WRNS Officers First World War, who had Canadian Roots.

- A Maclennan: born in Canada
- C Layard: gave her permanent address as British Columbia
- E Matheson: born in Toronto
- E Ross: file notes that she had worked in Canada

Korea Veterans Unit 26, Hamilton

To Honor and Remember the Forgotten Heroes: We are very blessed and pleased to meet many Veterans' advocates over the past years—their dedication and passion helps us remember the forgotten heroes of WWII, the Korean War and the Afghanistan War.

On November 2, 2015, we attended the "12th Annual Veterans' Appreciation Luncheon" at the Oakville Convention Centre. The event is organized by Kristin Courtney and her dedicated volunteers, and we always attend these luncheons. In attendance: over 1,000 Veterans, family members, CF members, RCMP, Police officers and dignitaries. The Korea Veterans Association of Canada, Unit 26 Hamilton and the Friends of HMCS HAIDA Association, the Hamilton Signal Association all had displays. The miniature HMCS HAIDA model caught the curious minds of many young students.

The annual "Host a Vet Salmon Fishing Derby" is now in its 8th year. Hosted by retired LCol Guy Smith, it is open to all military members and retirees—at no cost. The event takes place in June and starts out in Bronte Harbour near Oakville. The boat Captains generously donate their boats and all gear required

for a morning of fishing. All salmon are weighed and prizes are awarded afterwards at the post-event BBQ. For all involved it is a fantastic event to not only honour the Veterans, but it also helps dispel any stress relating to PTSD. Special mentions: Keven, Wendy and Roy Ellis of the North Wall Riders Association; and the "Candle Light Vigils".

On Jan 12, 2016 we attended a special dedication ceremony at the Royal Canadian Legion 144, Pinellas County, Florida. The event was held to honour the 13 fallen pilots from Florida who served in the RCAF during WWII as Halifax Bomber Airmen.



Special Mentions: RCL 144 Commander Gordon Bennet who is a Canadian Korean War Veteran; Vice Commander Dann Oliver who conducted a wonderful memorial ceremony; Karl Kjarsgaard, director of the Bomber Command Museum of Canada; John Stemple of the Nanton Lancaster Society; and JR Hafer of 20th Century Aviation Magazine. All are great advocates of the RCAF fallen veterans. The WWII flying heroes had been forgotten over 70 years until the dedication plaque was donated to the Winter Haven Airport—where they trained to fly. As John read their names, with a song called "Miles Away" written by a son of the Korean War Veteran, their spirits finally came home and they will be remembered.

Several days later, we carried the Korean and Canadian flags as members of the colour party for the 16 Allied UN Korean War Veterans' commemorate service at Largo, Florida. We all agree that it is never too late to honour the forgotten heroes who gave their lives for our freedom. We Will Remember Them.

Healthy Eating

Salt Cod & Potatoes:

Makes 4 servings

Ingredients:

- 1 lb salt cod, pieces or boned
- 2 lbs potatoes
- 1/2 lb salt pork (sliced)
- 1 lg onion (med chopped)

Method

Soak salt cod in cold water overnight (approx 6-8 hours). Drain and replace with cold water. In med-size pot, bring potatoes

to slow boil and simmer for 20 minutes. Add fish and cook until tender (approx 15-20 minutes).



While cod is cooking; in a skillet, med heat, fry salt pork until all fat is extracted. Remove salt pork and add onions. Cook onions until golden brown and remove from heat. Spoon onions and pork fat over fish and potatoes. Garnish with rendered fried pork. This is excellent with homemade fresh bread and molasses.

Tip—Ensure water is two inches above fish prior to boiling.

Healthy Aging

The Itchy and Scratchy Article: Itchy skin or pruritus is that uncomfortable, sometimes overwhelming, sensation that reflexively makes you scratch. It ranges from affecting a small area of the body to the entire body and can be associated with redness, lumps, blisters and changes to the texture of the skin.

A very common cause of itchy skin is simply dry skin. Hot or cold temperatures with low humidity, washing/bathing too frequently, and continuous use of air conditioning or central heat can all contribute to dry, itchy skin. However, there are a number of other causes leading to itchy skin, including:

Skin conditions: psoriasis, eczema, chicken pox, hives. Allergic reactions: environmental, animal, food, clothing, chemical. Medical diseases: liver disease, kidney failure, thyroid problems (These issues often cause itching over the entire body, without any associated lumps, redness, etc.). Nerve Disorders: diabetes, multiple sclerosis, shingles. Drugs: reactions to antibiotics and narcotics (Ex: Percocet, Tylenol #3) are common. Pregnancy: itchiness to the abdomen, breasts and thighs are common.

To help relieve the irritation of itchy skin there are a number of options:

- Hydrate, hydrate! Your skin will thank you for the extra water.
- Moisturize, moisturize, moisturize! Using hypoallergenic, non-perfumed creams like Aveeno* and Eucerin* (among many others) can be helpful.
- Avoid scratching. Try covering the area and keeping your nails short.
- Apply cool, wet compresses.
- Have a lukewarm bath: add baking soda and uncooked oatmeal.
- Wear loose, cotton-based clothing.
- Use mild soaps with no perfumes or dyes. Wash soap completely off your skin and then see #2 (yes, moisturize).
- Try mild, unscented laundry detergents with an extra rinse cycle.
- Avoid substances that irritate your skin like perfume, cleaning products, jewelry (nickel is common irritant used in jewelry).
- Relax. Stress can make itching worse.

A physician may recommend a steroid-containing cream or an antihistamine (Claritin*, Reactine*, Benadryl*, etc). Although itchy skin is common and often self-limiting, you should see your doctor if the itchiness lasts longer than 2 weeks with no improvement, prevents you from sleeping, cannot be easily explained, affects your entire body and/or is accompanied by fatigue, weight loss, fever or redness.



^T Antihistamines are over the counter products, but should be taken in consultation with a physician if you have any medical conditions because it can make your condition worse.

Padre's Corner

Seafarer's Welfare: In the last issue I wrote about Seafarer's Welfare and the need for the establishment of facilities or local committees to see that seafarers entering our port facilities receive the proper shore leave and legal protections to which they are entitled by international treaties and protocols. It was pointed out that Canada is a signatory to these treaties and that every community that has a port has an obligation to provide the necessary facilities and protections.

Access to Port Welfare is covered under Part 4.4 of the International Labour Organization's Maritime Labour Convention 2006 and is furthered detailed under Guideline B4.4.3. Under the International Maritime Organization's Convention on 'The Facilitation of International Maritime Traffic 1965' provision for proper shore leave is mandated. Unfortunately the events of the past decade have impacted negatively on the rights of seafarers to appropriate shore leave and welfare facilities within certain jurisdictions.

Sarnia is a small port that has no harbour commission and the Mission to Seamen St. Clair Region operating as the Mission to Seafarers / Stella Maris has been responsible for providing the necessary care for seafarers from all over the world for the past 30 years. On occasion the mission has been involved in assisting crews and individuals with filing accident reports, the reporting of unsafe conditions, and suggested infractions of international labour regulations. The mission has also provided free transportation to crew members to hospitals and medical clinics for treatment etc. and also to the malls, and other attractions. The volunteers have often welcomed crew members into their own homes. A supply of warm clothing, books, magazines, videos and warm clothing has often been on

hand for those requesting them or seen to need them.

This is the work that the seafarer missions around the world have been mandated to provide. Many ports have facilities where crew can relax, have a beer, play cards, pool, or sports, and perhaps call home or access the internet. Spiritual care is available if they desire and sometimes counseling. Due to the stressors resulting from isolation, hazardous working conditions, and piracy a number of seafarers are exhibiting symptoms of P.T.S.D. and readily seek spiritual or counseling services.

The R.C.N.A. can play a part by joining other volunteers in advocating the establishment of Port Welfare Authorities in local ports across the country. These authorities

would involve representatives of local government agencies, labour and industry groups etc. The International Seafarers' Welfare and Assistance Network (ISWAN) and the U.K.'s Merchant Navy Welfare Board have launched an international effort to establish these authorities.

The work that is performed by seafarers missions and clubs around the world to care for seafarers regardless of race, colour or creed greatly helps not only the seafarers but also helps the governments and regulatory authorities to fulfill their obligations to the maritime industry under the various United Nations conventions. As those who have an interest and connection to the sea we can be involved in a real and meaningful way.


